FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends

Over the next few weeks, we are going to look at the life of St Paul, focussing on his conversion, his mission and his perseverance.

Of course, at the beginning there was no one called Paul! He was Saul of Tarsus, and he was an enemy of Jesus and his church. Having been a bystander at the martyrdom of Stephen, Saul had approached the Jewish leaders for permission to head to Damascus to arrest any Christians he could find. (*You can read Saul's story in Acts chapter 9*)

But God had other ideas! In the original Damascus Road experience, Saul met the risen Christ in all his glory. Having been brought to his knees, and temporarily blinded, Saul was confronted with his error, humbled by the voice of Jesus and led into the city like a little child. For three days he prayed, eating and drinking nothing, until a disciple named Ananias was commissioned in a vision to visit Saul. Ananias greeted Saul as a brother, prayed for him so that he regained his sight, and baptised Saul as a Christian.

Some people have political conversions, moving from left to right or vice versa. Some people ditch the football team of their youth and start supporting their bitter rivals. Coffee drinkers swap the bean for the tea leaf. Sugar monsters go lean and change their diet. Many of us have moments where our minds and lives are changed, but I doubt that we can find many conversions as dramatic as Saul's. He went from hating Christ to loving him.

From shutting down gospel witness to preaching in the city centre. From persecuting the church to being persecuted. From being an enemy of every Christian to being a beloved brother in Christ. And God was only just getting started!!!

What brought about this dramatic change? It was nothing less than an encounter with Jesus. On the Damascus Road, Saul met the One he had been persecuting and came away transformed. His life was turned around and sent off in the opposite direction. And as Saul/Paul walked the way of Christ and proclaimed the message God gave him, so his character increasingly grew more like the LORD he now served.

Encounters with God will do that to us as well. They may not be as dramatic as the one Saul had, but as we encounter God through his Word the Bible, in prayer and through the sacraments, so our lives will also be turned around. Our ambitions are altered. Our habits are reformed. Our characters are remade. And like Saul, the more time we spend with Christ, the longer we walk the way of Christ, the greater our desire to grow closer to Him, the more we are changed into the people God made us to be.

Sadly, like children being satisfied with mud pies in the garden rather than the sumptuous feast inside, we can often be fearful of what we do not know. We content ourselves with spiritual scraps rather than feeding on the True Bread of Life, but we need not live our Christian lives on such a starvation diet! If we draw near to God, He WILL draw near to us! (James 4:8) But as the verse goes on, we must not be double-minded. Only a steadfast pursuit of Christ will reap results. Only a willingness to let God be God will allow the Holy Spirit to do His work in us.

So, are you up for a life-changing encounter with Jesus? You may not need to change your name, but if you are ready and willing, you need only open up the scriptures, pray that God will speak to you, and follow where He leads.

Is it time to seek God yourself? Saul became Paul and God used him in remarkable ways. What might He have in store for us, I wonder?

Resource of the Week. This spring there are **TWO** Conferences (almost) on our doorstep that would be well worth investing time and money to attend.

KESWICK in DEVON is based at All Saint's Church Sidmouth (where I did my curacy) and is a 5-day gathering for ***Bible teaching, fellowship and worship in one of Devon's premier seaside resorts. This year the conference runs from 2-6 March 2026 and is entitled: CONFIDENT - '...continue in him, so that when he appears we may be confident and unashamed before him.'*** (1 John 2.28)

The two main speakers this year are **Dr Andrew Ollerton & Dr Helen Miller**

Dr Andrew Ollerton is a theologian, pastor and popular communicator. He works with Bible Society and developed The Bible Course, an eight-session guide to the big story of the Bible for small groups.

Dr Helen Miller lectures at Moorlands College in Dorset. She initially taught life skills to young people before lecturing in sports science at an FE College. She has also taught English as a foreign language in Thailand and the UK.

Nearer to Newton Abbot, but more expensive is the **RIISING LIGHTS CONFERENCE** which runs from 6th to 10th April at the Riviera Centre in Torquay. This is a much bigger conference, with people coming from all over the UK to attend. Rising Lights offers '...five days by the coast to hear God's word, to praise our risen Saviour, and to rest. With plenty for adults, teens, and kids, alongside space to enjoy Torquay with friends and family.'

The programme this year includes:

Paul Mallard, former pastor, author, and FIEC Director for the West Midlands, who will be opening up God's word each morning from the book of Philippians.

Tim Chester, who will help us explore how we can cultivate intimacy with Jesus by looking at the portrait of Christ's relationship with his people that we find in the Song of Songs.

Glen Scrivener, who will run a seminar track called *Evangelism for normal people*. Glen will help us think about what we communicate, how we do it, and - perhaps most importantly - how to make a start.

Rachel Jones will help us get better at praying.

Sharon James will lead seminars focussing on the lives of 4 people whose encounter with God renewed their zeal and changed the world. And

James Mildred from CARE will help us consider what Christians should believe about complex issues around the beginning and end of life and help us to act on them in our daily lives.

News from the PCC: Some Highlights from our Recent Meeting

Join us in giving thanks that our Christmas services were well attended and well received. Although promoting the 321 course during services was unusual, it has led to some people from outside the church showing an interest and coming along. By now you will have been asked to complete a feedback form about these services, and we will consider everything carefully as we plan next Christmas's events.

Work continues on our buildings. The full faculty request for the proposed changes at St Paul's are now with the Chancellor. We hope to go out to tender on the work soon, and God-willing, start the work in early summer. The PCC also agreed to seek permission for the full internal redecoration at All Saints Highweek, a new handrail for the slope at St Mary's Wolborough and for swift boxes to be fitted to the tower at St Bart's Ogwell. Plans are being drawn up for new toilets and a vastly improved entrance space at Abbotsbury.

With all the ongoing building projects to take our worship spaces forward into the late 21st century, will you join us in praying for wise decision-making, for the right contractors to be found, for safety on site? We are blessed to have Julie Boulton as our architect, advising, preparing drawings and generally smoothing the way with the diocese and other partners.

Please also pray for Clare Lillington, our treasurer and self-confessed lover of numbers. She works tirelessly for our parish (and many others!) ensuring that legacy money is used appropriately, claiming back VAT (whilst we still can!) and other entitlements and generally keeping things in good order. This year she will need to prepare a more complex set of accounts as our income has increased, so please prayerfully support her in this.

We value our clergy, and the PCC Standing Committee will look at how the Clergy Wellbeing Covenant can be practically expressed in our parish. They will report first to the PCC, and then to the congregations.

It was encouraging to hear from Fr Matthew Cashmore about his ministry at St Luke's and St John's. Let's pray for strong links and good relations with all churches in the parish.

As a PCC we want to keep ourselves informed about parish life and will be inviting speakers into our meetings to tell us what they are doing (e.g. children's workers, Anna Chaplains)

Looking ahead to Lent, the clergy will be preaching on the subject of prayer, and midweek there will be sessions enabling us to put the teaching into practice. More details to follow.

Enjoying an autumnal walk

Happy New Year! We are delighted to share with you that we are expecting a baby girl in mid-May. So far, the pregnancy has been going well and despite the tiredness, Rachael managed to attend all the lectures and complete all the assignments for the first semester of her part-time master's. Bernie has been a wonderful help all round, especially making sure that Rachael is eating plenty of broccoli!

We have both greatly enjoyed our studies this semester. Together, we attended classes on the book of Isaiah, which has previously seemed like a daunting book to tackle. We've really appreciated getting a handle on how the whole book fits together and have been particularly struck by God's concern for righteousness and justice along with his great compassion for those living on the fringes of society. It's led to many fruitful discussions thinking through what this might look like in practice in a Ugandan setting.

Bernie has also studied the doctrine of God this semester and continued with third year Greek and second year Hebrew. He has improved in his knowledge to be able to translate more of 1 Peter and Hebrews from Greek into English and Rachael has benefitted from his learning during our morning devotions.

Rachael has completed a module on research methods ahead of getting going with her dissertation where she hopes to think through the understanding of the theology of the child in three Anglican churches in Kampala and how that might inform the training and equipping of Sunday school leaders. She hopes to do her field research in Uganda when they visit in August (with baby in tow!).

There are various admin tasks on the horizon which we would appreciate your prayers for. We need to apply for Bernie's UK visa extension (by the end of January) which is a time-consuming job but should be straightforward. Pray that process runs smoothly. Bernie would also like to apply to do a master's in theology next year and so will begin the application process for that in the coming months along with applying to various grants and trusts to cover the cost of fees and living expenses. He hopes to focus on the minor prophets (who are so rarely read and taught in Uganda) and think through how those books in particular might serve the church in Uganda. Before we came back to the UK, we were both advised by Ugandan colleagues to try to get our master's while we were in the UK as that will open up more teaching opportunities for us upon our return. Lastly, on the admin front, we have some AMIE (Anglican Mission in England) papers to read through before formally starting the discernment process which could lead to ordination.

For various reasons we were unable to visit Bernie's family in the States over Christmas, but we very much hope to visit next year, especially so that Bernie's mum can meet her newest granddaughter. Also, on a global front, please pray for Uganda. As I type, the internet has been turned off across the country. It is expected to stay that way for the next 5-7 days as elections take place on Thursday 15 January. There have been videos making the rounds on social media of hundreds of military personnel making their presence known across the country so as to intimidate voters. Pray for a peaceful election and for there to be no loss of life.

Please also pray for The Good Shepherd Primary School situated in a Kampala slum where Rachael used to teach. Just before Christmas, Gloria (one of Rachael's previous students who was full of life and character) passed away due to lack of funds for medical care. She had just sat the equivalent of her GCSEs. We wish we could have known about her situation before it was too late. Currently, the headmaster's wife, Razia, is unwell. Pray that she would get all the medical help she needs and would make a quick and full recovery.



Hosting friends from Uganda at Oak Hill

Amidst our studies, we have been overjoyed to host many people over the last semester: family, supporters, friends and even some people who used to be in the youth group Rachael led many years ago. Most recently, we hosted a group of nine (mostly) Ugandans whom we know from our time in Uganda but who are currently residing in the UK. It was such a joy to be together over four days of fun, laughter, fellowship and mutual encouragement. We treasure all these times together and look forward to more in the months to come.

We sometimes find it hard to take time off and to rest well (Rachael in particular). We were blessed by friends who loaned us their home for a week back in September which enabled us to enjoy a change of scenery, some coastal walks and sea swimming. Other friends are loaning us their home in the south of England for the last week of January before the second semester begins. Do pray for deep physical, mental and spiritual rest for us as we decompress from a busy but wonderful semester.

Finally, do continue to pray for our health. Rachael was especially unwell in the lead up to Christmas with a chest infection which led to out-of-control asthma which was quite scary at times. Thankfully, she is much better now.

We would not be able to do any of this without you. We are deeply grateful for your support of us in so many and various ways. Thank you! We love hearing from you and endeavour to pray regularly.
